
Magistra Manley, a beloved Latin teacher who inspired hundreds of students, passed away on January 6, 2018. Magistra Manley helped found two Arizona schools during her 21-year teaching career, Tempe Preparatory Academy and Scottsdale Preparatory Academy. She joined John B. Connally High School in Texas in 2016. During her time at TPA and SPA, she led a number of students to many AZJCL conventions as well as a group to NJCL convention.

Her enthusiasm and passion for Latin made many students realized the "dead" language was full of rich history and traditions. She organized feasts of dishes from ancient Rome. She delighted classes with costume contests, mock Roman weddings, Latin readings of "How the Grinch Stole Christmas," and a mural of gods, goddesses and gladiators. Even as her pain worsened, her dedication for teaching and creating the best environment for her students never wavered -- she insisted on leading trips to Washington, D.C., and the Getty Villa in Los Angeles, where students examined a replica of a Roman country house and objects dating back as far as 6,500 B.C.

Typically celebrated on February 15th, Lupercalia was an ancient Roman festival celebrated annually to avert evil spirits and to purify the city. To celebrate, Scottsdale Preparatory Academy hosted an event on February 10th to get various Arizona schools to celebrate. The event had a variety of activities: certamen, scansion contest, and an activity called "telestrations" (similar to the game "Telephone" but done with illustrations). During the Roman times, Lupercalia began with a sacrifice by the Luperci, Lupercalia's own priesthood, of goats and a dog. Thus, to honor this rite, Scottsdale Preparatory Academy ended the event with food, but most importantly with a goat cake!




Artifacts, volcano, and jewelry, oh my! This is just what many students and teachers see and experience when they visited the Pompeii Exhibit at the Arizona Science Center.

The exhibit began with a dramatic video that introduces Pompeii. Then, students and teachers journeyed through the ancient city, where they encountered a Roman villa, a market, and the bustling streets of Pompeii. From there, they experienced a simulated volcanic eruption (in a 4D theatre) and witnessed the impact of the eruption over 24 hours. Finally, the exhibition culminated with "the reveal of authentic full body casts of human forms, poignantly dramatizing the impact of the extreme heat and noxious gases that left them forever frozen in time." If you or your teacher still would like to go, the exhibition is opened until May 28th, 2018. The exhibit requires a timed-entry ticket and purchase of general admission. Advance reservations are highly recommended. Guests can purchase tickets online or in person at Arizona Science Center.
